Ideas that serve homeless

- Heat mitigation/ weatherization
- Tree Canopies
- A water spigot.
- Public phone bank facility; Place to charge phones.
- Outreach worker storage for supplies/distribution.
- Food truck mall for food deserts. Food truck co-op.
- De-paving would be a good use of the city improvement funds
- More mobile showers, Equip more clinics with showers & laundry services
- An urban rest stop or hygiene hub for bathroom and shower facilities. (x3)
- A mobile cooling center. Like a bus that would park in an area and give people a
 way to get out of the heat/cold. When full, put a time limit, to allow people to
 recover before going out again.
- Low-income housing and comprehensive wraparound services that are accountable.
- Seed money for a community land trust for housing that helps people stabilize and move to more permanent housing. Define "shelter" as this kind of stabilization site and help transition to more permanent housing.
- We could develop Hubs of Healing where housing, growing food, internal governance processes, etc.; where people learn and grow and find multiple pathways away from homelessness.
- Need robust ongoing BH services to help people decompress from having to sleep on the streets and get ready to function in more socially engaged settings.

• Allow recently-housed people to stay in a place that feels safe until appropriate housing is available.

The cynical pushback on participatory budgeting:

\$1M of a \$4.3B budget and splitting the city into 5 districts and different conversations isn't a big commitment and is a lot of energy directed to dubious collective impact. We spend more than this on Nimby boulders, fencing, and sweeps. What if the thousand people participating in this put that energy into demanding more affordable housing? This hijacks a lot of budget policy bandwidth and doesn't feel like a productive place for coalition energy. Nonetheless, we are impressed with Kenny's sincerity.

Kenny's pushback on the cynical pushback ...

I can understand your cynicism. This is definitely a baby step. (For the record, it's \$5,000,000 total.) I will never diminish your valid concerns, but I will also share my perspective that this kind of project is also instructive for the City, to educate us that we can keep working more and more with our community members and see amazing things happen. It's the coolest thing I've ever gotten to work on and I will continue to advocate that we should do more and more co-creation with our community.

There's a lot of good we can do with five million dollars. And there's a lot the City needs to do to better serve its residents. Both things are true. I would love to partner with people here to succeed at both. Please keep us accountable. If you don't see the money spent as directed, speak up.
