What Would Maureen Howard Do (WWMHD?)

Ways to encourage and promote LE participation

- Offer compensation.
- Provide funds to pay homeless for their feedback or for staff to do outreach.
- Creating an environment and culture where everyone feels comfortable sharing ideas and experience.
- That trust piece really needs to be solidified. Sometimes people wont necessary share everything or be forthcoming because they're not feeling safe or trusting the system.
- People should speak to greater needs of group through personal experience.

- Power of peers is amazing. Because if they're a peer (also have lived experience) they trust them a lot more. Make them feel heard and seen.
- Importance of those within a committee/group with a mix of those with lived experience and lived expertise, elected, officials, members of the community at large to have their voice heard and respected and to have specific protocols to ensure respect, tolerance, and gratitude.
- Importance of drawing a distinction between those with lived experience (can be years ago, and for brief periods) as compared to those with "Lived Experience Expertise". Need feedback from both, but it is important to have that distinction based on what is attempting to be completed. Taking a true holistic approach.
- Funders asking for input and involvement of lived experience. What is meant by Lived experience and manifestation of said within an organization?

Ways to listen to lived experience

- Look at our past chats and meetings. Look at the summit sessions.
- About a year ago Pierce did a survey of those who went through coordinated entry, a lot of information as far as what they were unhappy with and additional barriers created unintentionally.
- Need for more foundational support, one size does not fit all we must support a more individual approach.
- The CoC has an MOU with the LEC that has not been fully optimized, esp in re: to a CoC hosted lived experience sub-committee and dispersal of LEC contact info to those entering CE.
- Advocated for by LEC for the last year via the IAB a survey of those receiving services (crafted with community feedback and serious considerations and ethical administration and collection). This should be partnered with a County Data dashboard and an Omsbuds office.
- Build a strategy to end homelessness: The program managers sit up too high and cannot see the issues on the street.
- Good for Pierce County to push for a broader definition of homelessness from HUD, not be so narrowly defined.
- Is there data in HMIS that can be mined for this purpose?
- Can the CoC produce a flyer/questionnaire that agencies or outreach can use to collect data? Check the box questions as well as open fields for unfiltered feedback.
- Strategies need to be holistic. A shelter may mitigate an immediate need, but it does not solve the larger issue. Where does one go from a shelter?
- We need more public education. People are so focused on roofs, but not on what a person needs for stability and growth.
- The public will not help individuals until they see them as people. Where we really have the fight is perception and misinformation.

Please refer street outreach programs to apply directly to our Overdose Education & Naloxone Distribution Program for kits for agency staff use. Previously, naloxone from DOH's OEND program could only be used for distribution to program participants, clients, and community members. As a result of new funding, staff and volunteers at certain agencies can now receive OEND kits for the purpose of responding to opioid overdoses experienced by your clients or participants. These agencies include syringe service programs; street outreach programs; housing and shelter programs; and community behavioral health agencies.
