## 2024 Homeless Point-in-Time Count Results

Each January, Pierce County surveys people experiencing homelessness. This homeless "Point-in-Time (PIT) count" is a one-day snapshot that captures the characteristics and situations of people living here without a home. We counted 2,661 people on our streets and in our shelters, but roughly 6,335 were connected to our homeless crisis response system during the same time. The lower PIT count number reflects the challenge of counting a large, geographically distributed unsheltered population over a 24hour period. Like all surveys, the Homeless PIT count has limitations. Results from the count are influenced by the weather, availability of overflow shelter beds, the number of volunteers, and the level of engagement of the people volunteers interview.
